# START QUT Frequently Asked Questions

## 1. What are the benefits of START QUT?

### Offers university experience

START QUT students will study university units generally in the same classes as current QUT students, improving their preparation for university study.

### Provides a guaranteed entry pathway

START QUT provides a guaranteed entry to certain courses at QUT for Year 12 students. The program allows students who pass two units (4 or better 7 being the highest) to gain admission to selected QUT courses and start studies in Semester 1 of the following year, following completion of Year 12.

### Offers a QUT scholarship

Year 12 students recommended by their school, who also have parent/guardian support, will be awarded a QUT scholarship to cover student fees for two university units. Note however, that there may also be other costs such as text books or laboratory costs that the student will need to cover.

### Offers academic credit

START QUT may also provide up to two units (24 credit points) of academic credit towards a bachelor degree course for related units, which has the potential to reduce future HECS-HELP debt.

## 2. Which students are best suited to the START QUT program?

Students should:

- have a strong interest in the subject matter of their proposed units of study
- be capable of undertaking the study successfully in addition to their current workload
- have the support of their school and parents/guardians
- display grades of a B average or above.

## 3. How do students apply for START QUT?

Students should identify an area of study interest and whether the QUT unit timetable can be accommodated into the student's school study schedule. Further unit content details are available from the START QUT faculty coordinator. The student should then complete the **Expression of Interest Form (EIF)**, as well as gain school and parental approval.

The EIF, along with Year 11 results (semester 1 and 2), must be forwarded to **QUT Admissions**:

It is essential that students put forward for the START QUT program have their application fully supported by their school and a parent/guardian.

Your application must be sent by your school START QUT contact to ensure that all required documentation and permission/signatures have been provided. This includes the Accounting in High Schools program.

**Note:** Applications will not be accepted unless the student's Learning Unique Identifier (LUI) has been provided. If students do not know their LUI they should check with their Guidance Officer/ School START QUT contact.

## 4. When do applications close?

Applications for semester two 2008 will open in late April and close on **6 June 2008**. Late applications will not be accepted.

## 5. Why do I need to provide my LUI?

Your Learning Unique Identifier (LUI) is used to report your results to the Queensland Studies Authority (QSA) in order for you to receive credit points towards your QCE.

### 6. Will I receive notification of my application?

Yes, you will receive notification of your application and any requests for additional documentation e.g. full Year 11 school report.

You will be required to submit the documents as soon as possible; if the documents are not received within the specified time to process your application before the start of semester, your application will be withdrawn.

### 7. Do I have to apply to QTAC to get my START QUT guarantee offer?

Yes.

### 8. Do I have to tell QTAC I am a START QUT student?

Yes, you should indicate in your QTAC application that you have participated in the START QUT program.

### 9. Is there an orientation session before classes commence?

For mid-year applications there is no orientation session however a START QUT orientation kit will be provided once you have accepted your offer.

### 10. I am an international student. Can I do the START QUT program?

Yes. International students will be required to submit the following documentation at the time of application:

- a certified copy of their visa
- a certified copy of all previous Senior/High School qualifications
- a certified copy of all previous English language tests
- a certified copy of detailed school reports for all semesters completed so far at the school
- a statement from the school which includes:
  - the duration of studies the student has undertaken in Australia in English
  - detailed comments on the student's English capability and ability to achieve an IELTS score level of 6.5.

If an international student is under 18 years of age, their School Principal will need to sign the Expression of Interest form to confirm that all required guardianship arrangements have been, and will continue to be, monitored by the school.

Once an international student is admitted into the START QUT program, the requirement for guaranteed entry into START QUT courses is the same as for all other students if the course is open to international students; eg Caboolture programs are not available to international students.

If a student seeks entry to a QUT course that is not part of the START program, they will need to meet the required OP, subject prerequisites, and English language requirements of their choice of study program (ie Sound Achievement or IELTS 6.5 and no subtest less than 6.0; for Built Environment and Engineering courses IELTS 6.0 and no subtest less than 6.0).

### 11. Can I use my START QUT guarantee to do a double degree?

Yes. Please see the list of double degrees on offer in the entry guarantee courses list.

**Note:** Students seeking to do a double degree might like to select units from each of the study areas. Double-degrees tend not to allow room for electives and therefore the students will be maximising their potential to gain academic credit from their START units.

### 12. Can I defer my studies and still get the guaranteed entry?

Yes. The START QUT guarantee is only applicable immediately after completion of Year 12. Therefore, students who wish to defer their studies must still accept their offer and also apply for deferment through QTAC.

Deferment exceptions are courses with additional entry requirements; e.g. auditions, portfolios, interviews, questionnaires, Dean's Scholars, Vice-Chancellor's scholarship, prior studies, prior work experience etc. Requests for deferment are lodged via QTAC.

## START QUT Frequently Asked Questions

### 13. Can I study externally in the START QUT program?

Not normally. This program is designed to give students an on-campus experience which is not applicable to external study. External study is also generally considered to be more difficult than internal studies.

**Exception:** The Faculty of Law (School of Justice) has negotiated an arrangement where START QUT students may study selected Justice units externally.

### 14. What subjects can students select?

QUT faculties have identified units/subjects that will be offered under the START program in 2008. Students can select two subjects in any combination.

### 15. Can START QUT students study units from two different QUT faculties and still qualify for guaranteed entry into selected QUT courses?

Yes. Students can select subjects from any area within the START QUT program, and apply for entry into any degree program that is part of the START guarantee.

### 16. Can I enrol in two units in the same semester?

No. The START QUT program is not designed for this and the added workload may cause you to be disadvantaged in working towards your OP.

### 17. Does QUT have special classes for high school students in the START QUT program?

No. START students are assimilated into QUT's mainstream first-year classes.

### 18. Where do I find timetables for START QUT subjects?

Timetabling information and web addresses for START units to be offered in second semester 2008 will be available online in late April 2008. Visit [www.qut.edu.au/services/adminpol/classtime.jsp](http://www.qut.edu.au/services/adminpol/classtime.jsp) and click on the 'Class and exam timetables' link.

### 19. When do START QUT students begin lectures?

START QUT students follow the same timetable as the rest of the university. Second semester for 2008 commences on 21 July (orientation commences 14 February), unless indicated otherwise on the timetable.

### 20. How many hours per week should START QUT students be prepared to allocate to a university subject?

The University recommends to all students that they allocate an average of ten hours per week per unit; three contact hours for lectures/tutorials and seven hours for additional study.

### 21. Will involvement in START QUT adversely affect students' Year 12 results?

This is a matter that deserves careful consideration. The decision to be involved in the START QUT program will depend on individual circumstances. There is no admission guarantee if a student does two units and only passes one. Many students' university aspirations may be best served by concentrating on getting the best OP possible for university entry.

A decision to join the START QUT program is no different to considering the effect of other commitments in the final year of high school such as sporting and cultural pursuits, paid employment, involvement in other vocational studies etc.

QUT recommends interested students consult widely with parents, school personnel and START QUT faculty coordinators during their consideration of the START program.

## START QUT Frequently Asked Questions

### **22. What if a START QUT student finds the QUT subject too difficult?**

If a START student is having difficulty with a unit they should speak firstly with their tutor or lecturer. The next point of contact is their START QUT Faculty coordinator. The student needs to speak with these contacts as early as possible so that appropriate steps can be taken. After consultation, should the student still wish to withdraw from their second semester unit, they need to do so via QUT Virtual before **19 September 2008** to avoid any academic penalty. Should they not withdraw by this date, a fail grade will be recorded on their QCE.

### **23. I received a grade 3 for my first semester unit. If I get a 5 for my unit next semester, will I still be eligible for the START Guarantee?**

No. For the START QUT guarantee to apply, you need two grades of 4 (or better), 7 being the highest.

### **24. I failed my first semester unit. Can I continue with the START QUT program for second semester?**

It is up to the individual faculty to decide. Faculties approve students to study one of their units in the START QUT program by deciding if they are 'academically qualified'. In some cases, a faculty may decide that a student who failed a unit in semester one is not academically qualified and might refuse permission to study a unit in that faculty. In these cases, students may want to consider applying to study a unit from a different faculty. Students who fail a unit will have this fail mark recorded on their QCE so it is important for you to speak to the appropriate people should you feel you are having difficulties (see response to Question 22).

Students should also consider that the START QUT Guarantee will not apply (as they will not be able to 'pass two units' as required) and it may be better to concentrate on their school work and OP to increase their chances of being offered a university place.

### **25. What if START QUT students complete only one unit?**

Students will not be eligible for the START QUT guarantee, but hopefully they will have benefited from the experience and, if the subject studied is relevant to their chosen course, may be able to use their unit to gain academic credit towards their degree.

### **26. I have passed two units but not completed my QCE, will I still be eligible for the START QUT guarantee?**

No. In addition to passing two units START QUT students must also complete their year 12 studies. However, they do not have to qualify for an OP.

### **27. If a student's OP doesn't reach the cut-off for entry into the designated START courses, but they have passed their two QUT units will they still be eligible for guaranteed entry?**

Yes. The START QUT guarantee is independent of the actual OP outcome.

**Note:** the START QUT guarantee is only applicable immediately after completion of year 12.

### **28. What if I decide not to commence the START QUT program and I have received an offer?**

When students receive their letter of offer they need to either accept or decline the offer on-line via QUT Virtual. Enclosed with the letter of offer is information on how to enrol and a link to the [gettingstarted.qut.com](http://gettingstarted.qut.com) website. This website is essential reading for commencing START QUT students as it provides all the information they need to get started at QUT.

### **29. I am enrolled in the Accounting in High Schools Program. Can I study another unit in the START QUT program?**

Yes, if you enrol in a unit in Semester two. No, if you want to enrol in a unit in Semester one; the Accounting in High Schools program is part of the START QUT program and requires you to be enrolled in BSB110 for Semester one. This is counted as your START unit for that semester.
